Sharing the load

Ten is confident its ensemble cast experiment *Five Bedrooms* will be a ratings winner like its other hit relationship dramas, writes Colin Vickery

wo of Channel 10's
most popular dramas
of all time are
Offspring and The
Secret Life Of Us.
Now Five Bedrooms, with a
cast headed by Kat Stewart and
Stephen Peacocke, is mining
similar territory with hopes of a
ratings bonanza.

The set-up is simple. Five singles meet at a wedding and decide to buy a house together as a way to get a foot in the overheated property market.

Liz, played by Stewart, is a lawyer struggling with a messy divorce and spiralling debt. Ben (Peacocke) is a tradie who has lived in a caravan for the past two years.

Heather (Doris Younane) has been trapped in a dull marriage for 25 years. Ainsley (Katie Robertson) and Harry (Roy Joseph) also jump on board. Hugh Sheridan is part of the cast as real estate agent Lachlan

Call it a Married At First Sight-like social experiment. Can these five people from very different walks of life manage to live harmoniously when they are suddenly thrown together under the one roof?

Offspring, with Asher Keddie as Nina Proudman and Stewart as sister Billie, lasted seven years and chalked up 85

The Secret Life Of Us, with a cast including Claudia Karvan, Samuel Johnson and Deborah Mailman, just pipped that with 86 episodes.

If Ten gets its way, Five Bedrooms will make it a trifecta.

"It (Five Bedrooms) is a little bit Offspring but when we show it to people they say it feels more like The Secret Life of Us," Ten program chief Beverley McGaryev says.

"It has a really good cast, is really watchable, and the leadin audience we get for *MasterChef Australia* will really help the show get going."

Having Stewart on board is an obvious win. The key creatives, Michael Lewis and Christine Bartlett, were writers on Offspring and had her in mind from the start.

"Liz is 42 and I don't think in her wildest dreams she thought she would be in a share-house," Stewart says.

"Although the show is different to *Offspring* it has a similar generosity and warmth which I really like. It is inherently optimistic.

"They're (characters) a motley crew. They're not the type of people you would expect to have dinner together let alone live under the same roof.

"Liz has a lot of status anxiety. She is someone who is really accomplished and smart but is caught up in the world of success.

"She had many properties and a lavish lifestyle but after an awful divorce she has to downscale enormously.

"This is an opportunity to live with her best friend (Harry) and it seems like a sound short-term stepping stone.

"Offspring was very much through Nina's perspective but this is a true ensemble piece.

"Billie was someone who didn't have a filter but Liz is all about filters. She is all about the mask. She has got a lot of walls up."

Peacocke flirted with Hollywood stardom (Hercules, Whisky Tango Foxtrot) after his years portraying Darryl "Brax"

But it is Australia that has
